

and then yield to somebody else, the Chair is going to consider that full recognition.

Mr. TEAGUE. Mr. Chairman, Mr. Daddario yielded to you.

The CHAIRMAN. I recognized Mr. Fulton here a couple of times. It is that which I refer to. Mr. Daddario.

Mr. DADDARIO. Mr. Chairman, I yield to Mr. Riehlman.

Mr. RIEHLMAN. Thank you, Mr. Daddario.

I followed your statement, Mr. Secretary, I think, very carefully and I think you have made statements clearly based on your own knowledge of the directive and how you feel it is going to work.

Our committee, I am sure, has an interest to know whether or not anywhere in this directive it is going to affect the relationship between NASA and the Army, because certainly you have some working programs and will have a continuing working arrangement between NASA and its programs.

Now is there anything in this directive which you realize will affect your relationships so that you will have to go through the Secretary of Defense to get permission to carry on programs with NASA, or vice versa, that NASA would have to go through the Department of Defense to work with the Army on projects?

Secretary STAHR. I don't believe there is any problem there, at all. Could I ask Secretary Morse who is on that coordinating board, to—

Mr. RIEHLMAN. I can't conceive anything being in the directive that would affect it.

Secretary STAHR. Neither can I.

Mr. RIEHLMAN. But our committee certainly has some interest in this directive, but our prime interest, I expect, would be whether or not NASA is going to be affected anywhere along the line in respect to its activities in space and whether or not there is any apprehension that we are eventually going to lose our jurisdiction in this field, or NASA is going to lose it.

Secretary STAHR. I see nothing in this directive which will bear upon that point, Mr. Riehlman.

General TRUDEAU. NASA uses us very little since they were able to secure ABMA, and 2,000 of our people, you know.

Mr. RIEHLMAN. I suspect that is true. You might apprehend that it is possible that NASA might lose some of its program, too.

The CHAIRMAN. Any further questions?

Mr. Daddario—

Mr. DADDARIO. I yield, Mr. Chairman.

The CHAIRMAN. Does anyone wish the Chair to recognize them?

Mr. FULTON. I have a question.

The CHAIRMAN. I recognize Mr. Fulton.

Mr. FULTON. I yield to Mr. Hechler without withholding any time whatever.

Mr. HECHLER. I want to be sure everybody has an opportunity, but I have another question.

The CHAIRMAN. The Chair recognizes Mr. Fulton. If you want to ask any questions, proceed to do it.

Mr. FULTON. I said I would wait for everybody else.

Mr. HECHLER. Mr. Secretary—

Mr. FULTON. Don't force me to ask questions.

Mr. HECHLER. Mr. Chairman.
