The CHAIRMAN. We have Mr. Richard S. Morse, Assistant Secre-

tary, and General Trudeau, if you are finished.

One more question I would like to ask you, Mr. Secretary, and then we will let you go. Did you have any recommendations submitted to you by your Chief of Staff?

Secretary Stahr. Very definitely, yes, sir.
The Chairman. Were they favorable to this order, or unfavorable? Secretary Stahr. I have heard nothing from him since the order was issued.

The CHAIRMAN. Do you know whether there was a meeting of the

Chiefs of Staff with reference to this directive?

Secretary Stahr. That I do not know.

The CHAIRMAN. We certainly thank you, Mr. Secretary. We have

kept you a long time.

Mr. Miller. I think in extension of what Mr. Fulton was talking about, these astronauts, and 3, 3 and 1, he is really concerned that they didn't include Members of Congress who wanted to go up.

Mr. Fulton. I have long since volunteered three years ago, and

meant it.

Mr. Daddario. I was just going to say since the gentleman from Pennsylvania has volunteered, I think we ought to find out where he stands on the list.

The CHAIRMAN. I don't know whether he would fall under this directive or not, but at any rate, Mr. Secretary, we are most grateful to you for being present here this morning. You have helped us a great deal.

We will release you now.

Secretary Stahr. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

The CHAIRMAN. Next, we will call Secretary Morse. Could we hear Secretary Morse and General Trudeau, together, in the interests of finishing there? I think these are valuable witnesses and some of them have strong ideas, and I personally would like to ask questions and I know everybody else would.

Do you have a statement?

Secretary Morse. No, sir, I don't think I was officially asked to appear until Friday.

The Charman. Do you, General Trudeau, have a prepared state-

General Trudeau. I have a brief statement in which I would like to answer the question on the capabilities and resources the Army has as of now in space programs.

The CHAIRMAN. You may make your statement.

(The biographical sketch of General Trudeau is as follows:)

Arthur Gilbert Trudeau is a native of Middlebury, Vt. He was graduated from U.S. Military Academy in 1924 and commissioned a second lieutenant, Corps of Engineers. Prior to World War II he served with various Engineer units of the Regular Army, National Guard, and Organized Reserves, and on

river and harbor duty.

In 1942 General Trudeau became the Chief of Staff of the Engineer Amphibian Command. After brief service in the Southwest Pacific in 1942, planning amphibious operations, he returned to the United States to organize and command the 4th Engineer Amphibian Brigade, then served as Deputy and later Director of Military Training, Army Service Forces. He was promoted to the grade of brigadier general in 1944.
