

CRIMES (AIRCRAFT).

No. 64 of 1963.

An Act to make provision with respect to Crimes committed on board certain Aircraft, and for other purposes.

[Assented to 28th October, 1963.]

[Date of commencement, 25th November, 1963.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate, and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, as follows:—

PART I.—PRELIMINARY.

1. This Act may be cited as the *Crimes (Aircraft) Act 1963*. Short title.
2. This Act is divided into Parts, as follows:— Parts.
 - Part I.—Preliminary (Sections 1–5).
 - Part II.—Crimes on board Aircraft engaged in certain Flights (Sections 6–9).
 - Part III.—Crimes affecting Aircraft (Sections 10–20).
 - Part IV.—Miscellaneous (Sections 21–29).
- 3.—(1.) In this Act, unless the contrary intention appears— (interpretation.)
 - “aircraft” includes any machine that can derive support in the atmosphere from the reactions of the air;
 - “Australia” includes the Territories;
 - “Australian aircraft” means—
 - (a) an aircraft registered or required to be registered in accordance with the Air Navigation Regulations as an Australian aircraft;
 - (b) a Commonwealth aircraft; or
 - (c) a defence aircraft;
