

*Decree of February 7, 1961*³

CHAPTER I. GENERAL CONDITIONS—AIR FLIGHT IN HAITI

Article 1 (Conditions of admittance to Haiti). 1) No aircraft may fly over Haitian territory, land thereon, or leave therefrom, unless it complies with the following conditions:

It bears the markings of nationality and registration in accordance with the provisions of Article 5 (1) of the decree concerning aircraft;

It is airworthy in accordance with the provisions of chapter IV of the decree concerning aircraft;

It is operated by personnel possessing appropriate and valid licenses and qualifications;

It is provided with the documents enumerated in Article 2, below;

It complies with the rules established in Article 9 of this decree regarding flight and maneuvering;

2) For aircraft which on Haitian territory undertakes test flights or is flown to a shop for maintenance, overhaul or repair, some of the conditions mentioned above may be waived by the Civil Aeronautics Board.

Article 21 (Flight documents). Except for a waiver under paragraph 2) of Article 1, all aircraft making a flight must carry the following documents:

- a) the certificate of registration;
- b) the certificate of airworthiness;
- c) the statement on maintenance;
- d) the licenses of the flight personnel;
- e) the trip ticket;
- f) if applicable, a license for the radio station aboard;
- g) if the aircraft transports passengers, a list of names indicating the places of embarkation and debarkation;
- h) if it transports freight, the transportation documents and manifest.

Article 3 (Trip ticket). The trip ticket, which shall be the responsibility of the pilot, shall contain the information required by international rules for each trip of the aircraft.

Article 4 (Radio communication). 1) Every Haitian aircraft which renders public air service and such other aircraft as is designated by the Civil Aeronautics Board must be equipped with radiocommunications according to the operating condition of the aircraft. A license permitting installation and use of the equipment is issued by the Secretary of State of Public Works, Transport and Communications. Only a person possessing a radio navigation license issued in accordance with international rules may use such equipment.

2) Any foreign aircraft equipped with radio-communications which flies over Haitian territory, or lands thereon, must have a license issued

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
