

5 percent over what we are already deriving from our various—I think we have seven programs. I should have that figure precisely in mind for you, but I don't. I think the Federal fund element here runs around \$7 or \$8 million at the present time, either expended or committed to our program.

A good deal of that is urban renewal money, which is on a three-quarter Federal grant basis.

The demonstration cities program might add another 10 percent, maybe, throwing all those programs together. Just as a rough guess—10 percent of \$7 million—we will say another million dollars.

This is over a 20-year period.

Mr. FINO. You are talking about Oil City.

Mr. BARR. Yes.

Mr. FINO. How about the county? How about the State of Pennsylvania? After all, we do have the chairman of the subcommittee coming from Pennsylvania—Philadelphia more particularly—and we want to be sure they are not short changed.

Mr. BARR. It might amount to a little more than that, because with the emergence of the poverty program phase of this thing, just now getting started, to which no funds have been previously committed—I presume that would swell it.

In answer to that, and I think that is a very pertinent and interesting question—this survey from which I quoted will, when it is completed, probably give us some figures on that.

At the moment, this survey has not been able to develop dollar amounts of Federal funds which are committed to our Pennsylvania cities.

Now, having once gotten that basic figure, I think this study group can go on and maybe get you a more precise answer. I will follow that through if you would care to have some further figures on it.

Mr. BARRETT. Mr. Mayor—I wonder if the gentleman from New York would yield to me.

Mr. FINO. I certainly do.

Mr. BARRETT. I certainly appreciate the gentleman from New York looking out for the welfare of Pennsylvania. But as chairman of the subcommittee, I'm greatly interested in seeing that no people, no cities, no areas in dire need for this kind of money are not getting their adequate amount.

Mr. BARR. Yes.

Mr. BARRETT. Everybody in every area that needs it—certainly I think we ought to work toward that end—to see that they get it. I appreciate the gentleman's interest.

Mr. BARR. Referring back to the comment of a previous witness here, as I came in, possibly that could be one—an additional element in the criteria, the intensity of need. We certainly do not want to overlook first off the areas of greatest need.

Mr. FINO. Well, let me just throw out a question.

Do you think that \$2.3 billion is going to take care of 60 or 70 cities that the Secretary talks about.

Mr. BARR. It certainly is not.

Mr. FINO. Digressing for one moment—and only because you brought in the poverty program—I was curious to know, because of all the criticism on this poverty program—does the director of the poverty program in your city receive more salary than you do?
