Mr. Schoene. Yes, Mr. Leighty is appearing with me, as I did with

him when he testified last week.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Lester P. Schoene. I am a lawyer, a member of the firm of Schoene & Kramer,

with offices at 1625 K Street NW., Washington, D.C.

I appear here this morning as counsel for the Railway Labor Executives' Association, which is the same organization whose chairman, Mr. Leighty, testified last Thursday. My firm has acted as counsely for the association in various matters for in excess of 20 years.

I have filed a statement in accordance with the rules, but with the committee's permission, I would like to discuss the issues that have sharpened up since that statement was prepared. In the course of my remarks, however, I will cover the subject matter contained in the statement.
