

Mr. BROWN. In any other area have there been amendments proposed recently dealing with the strike problem?

Mr. LUNA. No, sir.

Mr. BROWN. Thank you.

The CHAIRMAN. Mr. Luna, this concludes our hearing for today. We were glad to accommodate you today and have you here. We want to thank you for coming and giving the benefit of your views. This helps to make our record more complete on which to make a decision. It looks like decision day is drawing closer.

Mr. SPRINGER. I think Mr. Luna and Mr. Gilbert have been helpful today.

Mr. LUNA. I want you to know that we appreciate it. We are not an interested party in the six unions, you know. But we have gone through this. We know what they have testified. I am sure that you passed Public Law 88-108 with good intentions. We are sure of that. But we are sure that if you will look at the record and go through what we have been through since it passed, that, as I said, Lord help you, don't do it again.

The CHAIRMAN. Thank you very kindly.

This will conclude our hearings for today.

Mr. LUNA. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. CHAIRMAN. The committee will stand adjourned until next Tuesday morning. At that time we hope to have one additional witness, perhaps two.
