Results: 1. For the first nine weeks of each group, dropout rates were:

--Group 1: Less than 5%

- --Group 2: 16%
 --Group 3: 19%

 2. A sharp rise in the dropout rate (to over 20%) in the second 9 weeks for the First group, making it equal to the other 2 groups, occured; this change was concomitant with the rapid increase in enrollment of the total center
- The eight dorms in Groups 1 had a high retention rate for the first 9 weeks; furthermore, the dorms in Group 2 had a low dropout rate for the first 5 weeks, although they were filled more quickly. After June 30 the entire sample had a much higher dropout rate.
- 4. Therefore, the sudden increase in size of the whole camp, and the lessened emphasis on peer group enforcement programs, caused an increase in dropout rate in all 3 groups.
