run into difficulties because transportation poses such a problem in rendering services. The need to develop and exploit the tie-in between efforts for the rural poor and the relief of urban poverty seem particularly important in relation to those rural poor who are, or will be, migrating to the cities.

All in all, reports received do not reflect much activity in behalf of either the rural or elderly poor.

The following extended examples of Urban League programs in the war on poverty cover selected materials on OJT project, Project ENABLE, a VISTA training program, Project ASSIST, a Human Resources program, Housing Information Centers and a Neighborhood Development Center in Washington, D.C., variously funded by the OEO and major Executive Departments.
