educational development tests that he had already gotten a high school diploma and he was going to enter a university in New York this fall at 16 years of age.

It was a striking and exciting example of really just finding someone with exceptional talents and getting him moving.

Mr. Quie. From the Harris Survey, I note that only 29 percent of those who graduated from the conservation training said they were given enough training. This seems to be quite low and when you look at the others. Also in the Harris Survey where they gave the percentage of people in the occupation of what they are trained for, conservation was not included. Yet 3 percent received training in conservation farming and went into it.

I would ask, Mr. Chairman, that these two tables from the Harris Survey, be placed in the record. One is on page 50 and the other is on page 76 of the Harris Survey No. 3.
