

## Narcotics in the Mail Stream

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"The Inspection Service has investigative jurisdiction whenever the mails are used in furtherance of an illegal scheme, but our clions would be sorely limited without the cooperative quid pro quo which exists today among all law enforcement agencies."

When the Drug Enforcement Administration was established on July 1, 1973, its creation underlined the President's determination to win the battle against illicit narcones traffic in the United States. Here, for the first time, was a consolidation of various agencies into a single comprehensive organization, "empowered to investigate and prepare for prosecution all suspects for violation under the federal ting trafficking laws."

As with other segments of the law enforcement community, we in the Postal Inspection Service applicated the creation of DEA since our participation.

in narcotics investigations has always been a cooperative effort with the other agencies which prosecute under statutes within their own investigative jurisdiction. Although the yearly number of narcotics and drug cases which the Inspection Service opens is but a small portion of our total criminal investigations, the fact remains that today one out of every tive mail thieves is a narcotics user. Over 27 percent of all persons an ested for postal holdings are narcotics users. This dependence on drugs has become a major cause of postal crime since the unguarded letter box, especially in large inhan areas, represents an attractive target to the criminal who must support his addiction by facility of checks and money from the mail.

In the span of just a lew short years, on investigative involvement in nan otics and dangerous drug cases has increased tremendously. Since use of the mails in any unlawful activity is always a matter of investigative

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
