14f. Four mines Ann Gement of the excess property program than the amount of loan funds disbursed for facilities improvement, and other mines had not yet provided enough of their own funds to complete the facility program planned.

2. Instances when the team, surveying the facilities completed, erroneously reported equipment rented from KOMEP as facilities which had been procured

with loan funds.

In brief, our audit disclosed a significant number of deficiencies requiring corrective action. These deficiencies are detailed in the body of the report, accompanied by our recommendations for appropriate corrective actions.

Prior to publication, a draft copy of this report was submitted for review and comment to the Mining Branch of IED, which expressed concurrence in the report findings.

DETAILED FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

KOMEP MINING EQUIPMENT POOL

General

The KOMEP mining equipment pool consists of machinery, spare parts, and maintenance supplies and tools, which are to be used for exploring and developing those mines considered to have potential for producing coal and mineral ores. The pool commodities have been provided primarily from U.S. Army excess property (on a no-cost basis), and also by dollar funding of both new equipment and reimbursable U.S. Army excess property. The pool is physically located in two places, i.e., the OGS headquarters in Scoul, which handles most of the U.S. Army excess equipment, and at Chungju, which primarily handles the equipment, spare parts, supplies, and tools procured in a new condition with dollar funding.
