MII. DEADER. INV L and contring o Mr. Griffin. I would not say that would be the case of domestic excess

Mr. Beaser. Do you make them prove where they are going to use it?

Mr. Griffin. We have to compare needs of other agencies.

Mr. Beaser. When the AID man comes into your yard and says, "I want this truck under 608," do you say, "What country is going to use it? What project is that going to be used on? Is that already in the program?"

Mr. Griffin. That would go beyond the intention. Mr. Beaser. You do not know.

Mr. Griffin. We do not precisely demand that information. Let me answer you; this is not a requirement.

Mr. Beaser. That is right; so you don't know what they are doing

with the domesticaly acquired excess property.

Mr. Griffin. Well, let me just say this. As far as the donees who are the next step in priority, and the other Federal agencies, these yet. If the subcommittee directs us to take some action within the order of our responsibility, we will take the action.
