## STATEMENT OF HON. JOHN D. DINGELL, A REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS FROM THE

One of the most challenging aspects of our work as members of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce is the legislative oversight of Federal regulatory agencies, including the Federal Communications Commission. In observing the work of the Federal Communications Commission, it appears the appropriate solutions to problems are in constant decline.

An example of this is the Commission's recent announcement concerning pay television. On July third of this year, the Subscription Television Committee consisting of Commissioner James J. Wadsworth as Chairman and his colleagues, Robert E. Lee and Kenneth A. Cox, recommended that a report and order authorizing non-experimental pay television be adopted by the Commission.
