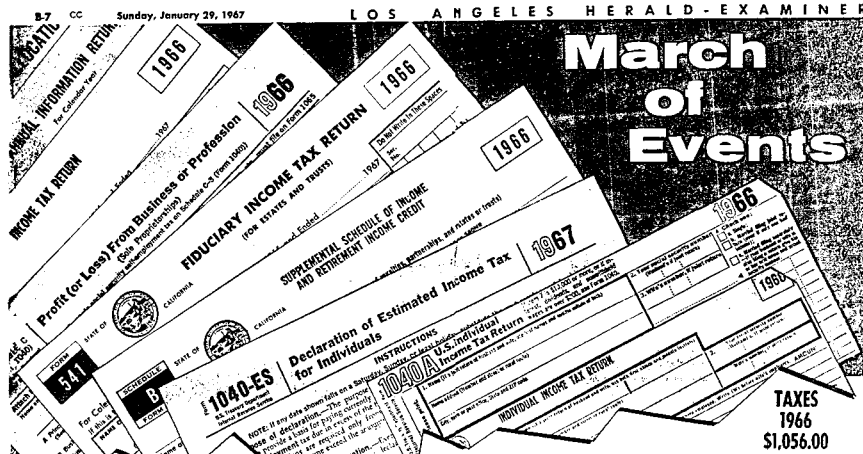

RISING TAXES: IS THERE AN END?

To paraphrase Mark Twain, everyone complains about taxes but nobody does anything. In a special tax-time report, The Herald-Examiner explores possible solutions to the taxing problem of taxes!

FISCALLY SPEAKING, this was the tax week that was.

On Monday, President Johnson asked Congress to extend Social Security benefits by \$1.1 billion to be financed by increased payroll taxes.

On Tuesday, the President called for "a measure of sacrifice" to finance the nation's biggest budget. A 6 per cent cut in present income taxes would help, he said.

On Wednesday, the Senate Committee on Educational Television asked Congress to impose an excise tax on all television sets manufactured in this country to finance noncommercial program production.

On Thursday, a Los Angeles city council committee recommended study of a \$32 million bond issue to offset operating losses of the Southern California Rapid Transit District. Taxes will help retire bonded indebtedness.

On Friday, the battle of words between Gov. Ronald Reagan and the students continued over whether students should pay tuition or the taxpayers should provide the complete support of the California university and state college systems.

On Saturday, taxpayers were asking each other where it all would end. Is there a way to survive in an economy of war, poverty and cultural demands; of income, sales and property taxes?

Alexander Smith, the 19th century Scottish poet, advised us to seek the thoughts of men of letters in matters of ignorance, war and taxes. However, Smith's counsel offers a basic dilemma too, in that even the academicians fail to agree on a solution to our tax problems.
