

Talking about environment, plants and animals, and our place in it, it might be a lot cheaper if we did the complete job in the first instance, recognizing that it is difficult.

Mr. GRANT. Assessing the damage, of course, has to go along with a correct assessment of the benefits.

Not to prolong this, there are many things which you have so correctly pointed out that need to be considered. There is an economic analysis which must be made in terms of the urgency of the problem and the need for solution, but also, proper consideration of the effects must be considered on a long-term basis as well.

Mr. DADDARIO. We could philosophize for the rest of the afternoon, I suspect, but we do not have time. We will be in touch with both of you. The committee appreciates your coming. We regret we had to sandwich you into what we knew already would be a full day. We have your statement in the record, and we will have a chance to follow through from there.

Mr. GRANT. Thank you very much.

Mr. DADDARIO. The committee is adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, at the same place.
