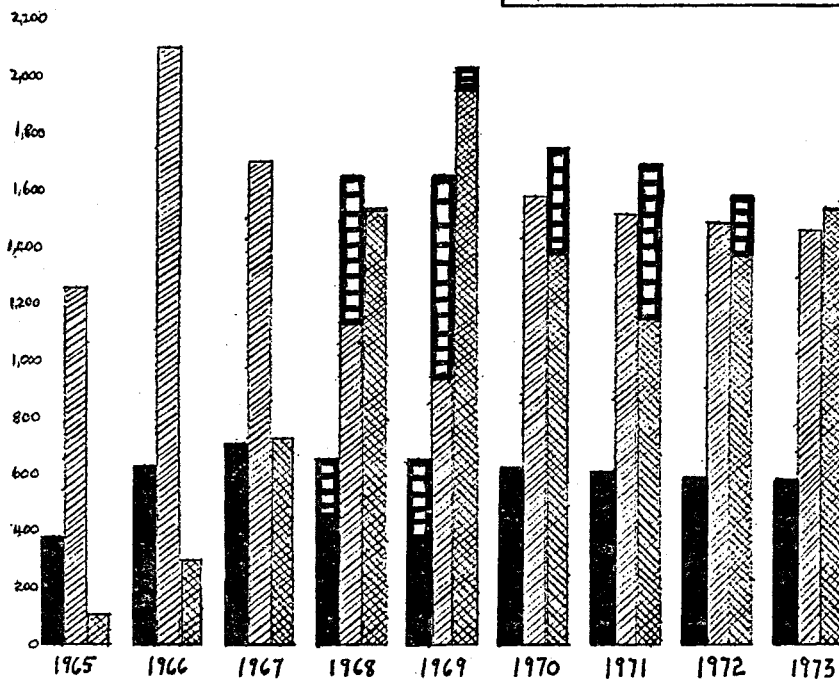

Mr. MUIRHEAD. It seems to me that, of course, the reduction is hurting and we are hearing about it.
