

STATE DIRECTOR, CIVIL DEFENSE

This is highly responsible administrative work, involving planning, organizing and carrying out a state-wide program designed to protect civilians in time of natural disaster or enemy attack. The incumbent acts as the Governor's representative on all civil defense matters and coordinates civil defense activities in all State Departments. When this position is included in the classified service, it usually requires college graduation and extensive administrative and planning experience in a large-scale public, military or industrial organization.
