This is responsible professional work, involving the development and administration of a continuing program of public information in the field of non-military defense. Duties include the preparation and dissemination of information to the local civil defense agencies and the public. This class usually requires college graduation, preferably with courses in communications, such as public relations or journalism, and considerable administrative and planning experience in the field of public information, or an equivalent combination of education and experience.
