Mr. Quie. Is this a 3-year program?

Mr. Quie. Is this a 3-year program?
Mr. Denny. Ours is a 2-year program.
Mr. Quie. That sounds like a pretty big dropout.
Mr. Denny. We have a number of part-time students. We have students in a mid-career status who do not actually receive degrees and who do not appear in the number of graduates.
For example, the National Institute of Public Affairs' midcareer program, they receive certificates. I suppose I should include them in the number of oraduates

the number of graduates. Mr. Quie. That is all.

Mrs. Green. Congressman Meeds, would you like to direct some questions to either one of these?

Mr. Meeds. I think not, Madam Chairman, in view of the time. Thank you.

Mrs. Green. Congressman Esch? Mr. Esch. No.

Mr. Esch. No.
Mrs. Green. Congressman Erlenborn?
Mr. Erlenborn. I have no questions.
Mrs. Green. My thanks to both of you gentlemen. We appreciate your staying here even after the 12 o'clock noon deadline. Both statements will be made a part of the record.
