STATEMENT OF HON. J. D. BRAMAN, MAYOR OF SEATTLE, WASH., ACCOMPANIED BY MILTON PIKARSKY, COMMISSIONER OF PUB-LIC WORKS, CITY OF CHICAGO, APPEARING FOR THE NATIONAL LEAGUE OF CITIES AND THE U.S. CONFERENCE OF MAYORS

Mayor Braman. Mr. Chairman, it is my pleasure to appear before you this morning, to appear before you and to testify on this important piece of legislation.

I have with me Mike Cafferty, a member of my staff, and of course

you all know Mr. Pikarsky.

In testifying this morning on behalf of the National League of Cities, of which I am the chairman of their committee of transportation, and the U.S. Conference of Mayors. We do have the representation that we are representing some 14,400 cities.

The position that we have is one that has been established by the steering committee and the committee of the National League of Cities and then passed through, by resolution, and became part of the national policy of the National League of Cities.
