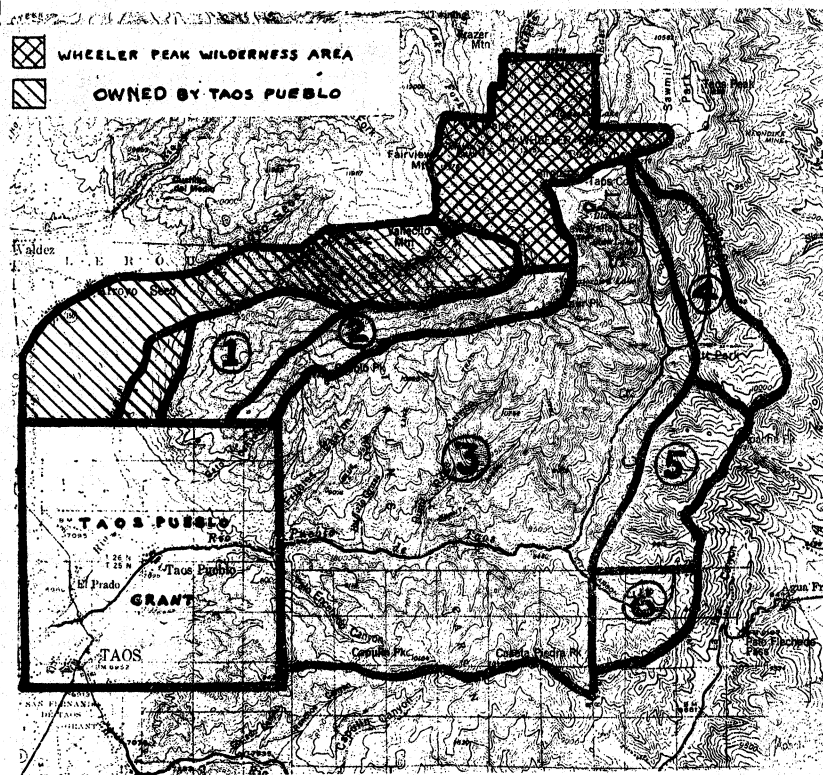




Tract 3 is approximately 32,450 acres in the watershed of the Rio Pueblo de Taos, which has been covered by a permit (Ex. 57) issued to the pueblo under the act of May 31, 1933 (hereinafter sometimes called the permit area).

Tract 4 is an area of about 2,809 acres known as Witt Park, which includes Bonito Park. Grazing permits have been outstanding for this area since 1918, but it was withdrawn from all forms of entry under the act of March 27, 1928, in recognition of its importance to the Indians. The present grazing permit covers 48 head from July 1 to September 15 each year. The rights of the permittee are protected under the bill, which authorizes the use of Pueblo funds to purchase such rights. The annual value of such rights is \$240 on the basis of \$2 per cow-month.

Tract 5 is an area of 3,520 acres known as Apache Springs. Grazing permits have been issued for this area since 1921. Like Witt Park, the area was withdrawn from entry under the act of March 27, 1928, by Executive Order 7361 dated May 5, 1936 (Ex. 49). The Forest Service has recently combined the Apache Springs grazing allotment with the La Junta Canyon allotment to form the Capulin grazing allotment. Six grazing permits are outstanding for that allotment covering a total of 191 head. Five permits cover 121 head from June 1 to September 30, and one permit covers 70 head from July 20 to September 30. The estimated annual value of those grazing rights is \$1,290.
