to claim land is an inherent right of the native population of any

nation.

If you look at it in other terms, yes, they do not have a right because they are what anthropologists call a subculture but they are very live and human and I would say the aboriginal title to land is very acceptable.

Senator Anderson. How far would you go on that aboriginal title?

Would you say the city of Chicago?

Mr. Belindo. At one time we owned 95 percent of the land and now we have only 3 percent left. We would like to keep the remaining 3 percent. If we could go to Chicago or the Great Lakes, naturally we would make that great surge.

Senator Anderson. Thank you very much, for your testimony.

The committee will reconvene at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.
