STATEMENT OF HON. MARGARET M. HECKLER, A REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS FROM THE STATE OF MASSACHUSETTS, INTRODUCING JOSEPH V. FERRINO, NATIONAL COMMANDER OF AMVETS

Mrs. Heckler. Mr. Chairman and my colleagues on the Veterans' Affairs Committee, it gives me a great deal of pleasure today to present Mr. Joseph V. Ferrino of Winthrop, Mass., the national commander of AMVETS, for his presentation before this committee. This is a personal privilege for me because I have been familiar with the Ferrino family for many years and have participated in a salute to the commander's brother, Dr. Peter Ferrino, given to him by the East Boston Civic Association 4 years ago and again in 1966 when he received the same award by this association.

As a member of this committee I have made one clear-cut observation during the brief 2 years that I have had the privilege of serving on it, and that is a feeling and a gratitude for the very effective selective processes of the national veterans' organizations in choosing their leaders.
