20 This had to be about 10 or 11. I woke up, I heard all
21 this shooting and I didn't know where it was coming from.

22 So after a while I heard a little girl's pounding
23 in the hallway pounding on my door and then I heard some-
24 body in the hallway telling her to get back upstairs.

25 After a while I heard all this shooting. The lights

1 was out and I didn't know where the shooting was coming
2 from. So I told my two sons-- they was in the opposite
3 room in the bed-- I told them to just lay down and don't
4 move.

5 So a few minutes later, after they had left, I
6 kind of peeped out the window and I seen them get in the
7 car.

8 MR. DRISCOLL: You saw what?

9 THE WITNESS: It was the State Troopers.
10 So I was so scared I didn't go back to sleep.

11 So the next morning when I woke up I
12 looked in my kids' room and there was bullet
13 holes in the window and on the side wall.

14 So about 2 or 3 in the afternoon, Satur-
15 day afternoon, in broad daylight, my daughter,
16 she was upstairs and my son was playing in
17 the hallway and the doors was locked and I was
18 in the kitchen.

19 That's when I heard all this shooting
20 again. So I didn't know what to do. I got
21 down under the table. So then I ran upstairs
22 to the lady's house and I put on my clothes
23 and we went across the street to the Fire
24 House.

25 The National Guardsmen were over there.

1 I asked them why was they shooting at us.

2 They said it wasn't them. He said it was the
3 State Troopers. He said when they come back
4 he will tell them don't be shooting over
5 through there because I said we have kids and
6 we haven't did nothing wrong.

7 The doors was locked. The kids wasn't
8 outside playing or nothing.

9 MR. DRISCOLL: Did you see what kind
10 of guns they were using?

11 THE WITNESS: It was long brown rifles.

12 MR. DRISCOLL: With a banner on the end
13 of it?

14 THE WITNESS: I think it was white.

15 MR. DRISCOLL: On the night when the
16 first shooting took place did you see the
17 men?

18 THE WITNESS: Yes. I peeped out the
19 window.

20 MR. DRISCOLL: Were you able to identify
21 the people who were doing the shooting as
22 State Troopers then?

23 THE WITNESS: Well, they had on white
24 helmets and they had on blue uniforms and I
25 knew the National Guard had on brown.

1 Q Might it have been Newark Police involved?

2 A I know the Newark policemen.

3 Q And it was not then?

4 A It was not then, no.

5 MR. LEUCHTER: Was your children's room
6 to the front of the house too?

7 THE WITNESS: The bedrooms is at the
8 front.

9 MR. LEUCHTER: Including the children's
10 bedrooms?

11 THE WITNESS: Yes.

12 MR. LEUCHTER: So the bullets came
13 through the windows of the children's bedroom?

14 THE WITNESS: Yes.

15 BISHOP TAYLOR: Do you know the difference
16 between the uniforms of the State Police and
17 the National Guard?

18 THE WITNESS: I couldn't say Yes or No
19 on that.

20 MR. DRISCOLL: She testified that she
21 knew the difference between the police and the
22 National Guard because the National Guard

23 J A N I E were wearing brown.

24 EXAMINATION Is that right?

25 BY MR. FORTUNATO: THE WITNESS: That's right.

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Q Your MR. DRISCOLL: That's as I remember it
and she identified this as a blue uniform.
