BY-LAWS

1. The zones for the elementary schools shall be as follows:

LINCOLN SCHOOL

All pupils residing within the area bounded on the east by the Turnpike, north of Ferris Street to the borough line; on the south by a line from Ferris Street to Brennig Place and thence eastward along Virginia Street (but not including the homes on either side of Virginia Street) to Main Street, and from that place Northeast along Main Street to the South River but including only the west side (odd-numbered side) of Main Street, shall be assigned to the Lincoln School.

CAMPBELL SCHOOL

All pupils residing in the area bounded by Wilcox Avenue from Main Street to the Turnpike, The Turnpike from Icker Avenue south to the East Brunswick line; the west side of Main Street between Wilcox Avenue and Jackson Street southwest to the end of Pottery Lane, thence southeast to the end of Grove Street and south to the Raritan River Railroad tracks thence eastward along the tracks to Willett Avenue and continuing from that place the west side of Willett Avenue to Kamm Avenue and continuing southeast to Appleby Avenue thence east to Caroline Drive (but not including Caroline Drive, and then southeast to the borough line, all streets now shown on the official map of South River as published by the Borough of South River shall be assigned to the Campbell School.

WILLETT SCHOOL

All pupils residing in the area bounded by the South River on east; theeast side of Main Street from the South River south westward to Jackson Street; thence the east side of the line south to the Raritan River Railroad and thence eastward to Willett Avenue; from that place the east side of Willett Avenue to Kamm Avenue and all the property east of the line continuing to the Borough line as described above, shall be assigned to the Willett School.

BUFFER ZONE

All pupils residing in the area bounded by the Turnpike from Icker Avenue to Ferris Street; the south side of the line from Ferris and the Turnpike to Brennig Place and thence along Virginia Street to Main Street; the west side of Main Street from Virginia to Wilcox and Thence along the rear of Wilcox Avenue westward to the Turnpike shall have a choice of attending either the Lincoln or Campbell School subject to the enrollment regulations set forth below.

- 2. All children within the respective areas as herein before set forth shall attend the school within set area, except that where children have attended schools in the past not now within the present boundaries, the parents of such child may have the choice of sending said child to the school previously attended. All children attending school for the first time must attend the school within the district above set forth.
- 3. Whenever the enrollment in a building, or in certain of its classrooms, is in the judgement of the Board excessive for the best
 interests of the pupils, the Board has the legal right to transfer
 pupils to another school with more adequate accommodations on a
