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2	OTTO W. VOPELIUS, having been duly
3	sworn according to law by the officer, testifies
4	as follows:
5	DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. KLEIN:
6	Q Mr. Vopelius, my name is Norman Klein. I'm
7	an attorney, and I represent Messrs. Weir and Giovannoli
8	and Green Village 139 Corp., the plaintiffs in an action
9	against the Township of Chatham, the Planning Board of the
10	Township of Chatham.
11	I don't know if you've ever been involved in
12	a deposition before, but what's going to happen is I'm
13	going to ask you a series of questions. You have been put
14	under oath. If for some reason either a question is
15	unintelligible to you or for some reason you can't hear it,
16	or I'm speaking too quickly, or if you have any problem
17	whatsoever with the question, please don't hesitate to
18	ask me to repeat the question or to explain it if you
19	don't understand it.
20	Should Mr. Bernstein for any reason object
21	to a question that I ask, please don't answer the question
22	until he's had an opportunity to state his objection and
23	until he has given you permission to answer the question.
24	Do you understand that, sir?
25	A Yes, I do.

2		Q You are employed by the Township of Chatham?		
3	A	Yes.		
4		Q In what capacity?		
5	A	Superintendent of Public Works.		
6		Q And as superintendent of Public Works what		
7	are your duties?			
8	Ä	I run the Public Works Department and have five		
9	divisions under me.			
10		Q What are those divisions?		
11	A Streets and Roads, the shop, buildings and grounds,			
12	utilities, water pollution control.			
13		Q Are there subdivisions under utilities and		
14	water pollution control?			
15	A	Now, I don't know what you mean by subdivision.		
16	Separate divisions, yes. Both separate divisions. Water			
17	pollution and utilities are separate.			
18		Q Under utilities what functions do you		
19	administer?			
20	A	They maintain the parks and grounds, recreation		
21	areas;	sanitary sewer lines; traffic control signs and		
22	traffi	c lights.		
23		Q What about water pollution control? What is		
24	that?	What does that entail?		
25	A	That's the operation of the water pollution control		

1 Direct 4 2 plant, sewerage treatment plant. 3 That's the sewerage treatment plant? 0 4 A Yes. 5 And I take it from what you've said, that that Q 6 is distinguished from the maintenance of sanitary sewer 7 lines? 8 Yes, it's a different crew. A 9 Now, I understand that the township owns its Q 10 own sewerage treatment plant at this time? 11 I believe that's right, yeah. A 12 And where is that plant located? Q 13 At the foot of Tanglewood Lane. Α 14 Where is Tanglewood Lane? Q 15 Off Fairmount Avenue. А 16 Fairmount Avenue is right out here? 0 17 Uh-huh. А 18 And Tanglewood is--Q 19 А [The witness points.] 20 Q In a northerly direction? Southerly. Well, Fairmount runs north to south, 21 A so westerly. Tanglewood runs off. 22 What is the capacity of that sewer system? 23 Q 750,000 gallons per day. Α 24 What kind of treatment is that? Q 25

2	A I can't give you the exact title of it because		
3	there's different type treatments, and I'mwhen it comes		
4	to this I'm a layman, not licensed. It's a trickling		
5	type treatment.		
6	Q Does the sewer plant contain provisions for		
7	tertiary treatment, or is it only what they call		
8	secondary treatment?		
9	A No. There is tertiary treatment there.		
10	Q And where does the water after the effluent		
11	is treated, where does the water go to?		
12	A It enters what is known as the Mosquito Control		
13	drainage canal into the Black Brook in the upper Passaic		
14	River.		
15	Q When was this plant built?		
16	A I think it went on the line or on stream, started		
17	operations August of 1967.		
18	Q Now, has it been in any way expanded or		
19	modified since August of '67?		
20	A To my knowledge, no.		
21	Q Now, there are various interceptor lines		
22	running from that plant, are there not?		
23	A Yeah. There'suh-huh. To the plant you mean?		
24	Not from, but to.		
25	Q To the plant.		

1 Direct 6 2 What areas of the town does the plant 3 presently service? 4 I'm trying to think how I can answer that. A 5 Well, let me show you and see if this can Ú 6 help you in some way. The sanitary sewers system map 7 prepared on--I don't know who it's prepared by. Robert 8 Catlin Associates, which is part of the Master Plan 9 adopted by the Town in 1978 and has been already marked 10 P-2 in evidence. Off the record. 11 12 [There is a discussion off the record.] 13 A The map isn't that easy to read, but the entire 14 town as you well know is not serviced by sanitary sewers. Sections of River Road, for example, that are not covered, 15 and other sections of town that are kind of hard to dis-16 tinguish here. 17 Well, could you tell me generally what Ũ. 18 19 sections along River Road, for example, are not serviced? Well, approximately from--approximately I say А 20 because there is a section approximately from Roosevelt 21 Road towards the Chatham Borough which is not, and this 22 other section at the other end of River Road that is not. 23 This looks very close to it. 24 I can't tell you because the map isn't enlarged 25

3	[There is a phone call.]				
4	MR. KLEIN: Would you please read back				
5	the last question and answer?				
6	[The pending question and answer are				
7	read back by the reporter.]				
8	Q Do you have maps in your office which would				
9	better define the exact area of where the collector and				
10	interceptor lines run into the township?				
11	A Yes.				
12	Q Does that map have a special name?				
13	A I'm not sure.				
14	Q How would I refer to it for you to know what				
15	I'm talking about?				
16	A I'm trying to think of the title of the map. I				
17	can't really think of it. What does that one say?				
18	Q Sanitary Sewer System, and the source of it				
19	is Township Engineer and Elson T. Killam Associates.				
20	A I can't think of the name of the map. There is one				
21	I think Mr. Kirkpatrick or the municipal engineer or Elson				
22	T. Killam designed which designates the area. It's on a				
23	much larger scale.				
24	Q Is any portion of the River Road area that				
25	you were referring to that is not serviced by your plant,

2	is that serviced by the Madison/Chatham joint meetings?
3	The River Road area?
4	A Yesnot to my knowledge, no.
5	Q Is that a septic area then?
6	A Yeah, as far as I know then, yes.
7	Q To your knowledge in 1967 has the town been
8	involved in making of any applications relative to either
9	expanding its sewer system or building a new sewer system?
10	A Was your question had they made any applications?
11	Q Well, have they been involved in the process
12	of making any applications?
13	A Yes. From what I understand, yes. I don't get
14	involved in that, no. I'm just in charge of maintenance.
15	Q Who to your knowledge would have the information
16	relative to whatever applications the town had made con-
17	cerning the expansion of its sewer system?
18	A Elson T. Killam and John Miller, our attorney, as
19	far as I know.
20	Q Have you attended any meetings relative to
21	the expansion of the sewer system?
22	A Not to my knowledge. I haven't, no. Not directly.
23	Q Have you prepared any reports or do you
24	provide any input for either Elson T. Killam or the Township
25	Committee relative to the expansion of the sewer system?

2	A Not that I'm aware of. We make monthly reports,
3	and there may be a report periodically that asks of the
4	operation of the plant which I receive from the sewer
5	plant operator or chief operator I should say.
6	Q What is the substance of these monthly
7	reports?
8	A The daily flow, State-required flow, chemical
9	oxygen, suspended solids. This is a comparison. What
10	the land is operating at and what the State requires.
11	Then it goes through the routine job performed
12	each month at the plant site. Killam receives a copy of
13	that also.
14	Q To your knowledge have there been any
15	applications made by the Township prior to 1979 for the
16	expansion of its sewer system?
17	A I believe so. It's only hearsay though because I
18	don't get involved in that.
19	Q I show you this statement which was marked
20	Exhibit P-13 at a prior deposition. That's the Mayor's
21	statement. You can hold on to it.
22	A What's your question?
23	Q Are you familiar with that?
24	A I know of the meeting, yes.
25	Q In fact you attended the March meeting, didn't

3	A I probably did. There's been several. I know I			
4	attended one. I don't know which meeting I attended, but			
5	I know I attended one.			
6	Q You had several? Were thereother meetings			
7	with developers?			
8	A From what I understand.			
9	MR. KLEIN: Off the record.			
10	[There is a discussion off the record.]			
11	Q I show you this letter of Mayor Willis dated			
12	May 3 to Stephen Nieswand. Can you identify that letter?			
13	A You say can I identify it? You mean have I seen it			
14	before?			
15	Q Yes.			
16	A Yes.			
17	MR. KLEIN: Why don't we mark this			
18	and we can continue with the numbering.			
19	[The letter dated May 3, 1979, is			
20	received and marked P-14 for identification.]			
21	Q Mr. Vopelius, I now show you a letter dated			
22	June 4, 1979, from a Paul C. Curisko to Mayor Willis, and			
23	I ask you if you have ever seen that before?			
24	A Yes.			
25	MR. KLEIN: Could we mark that, too,

3	[The letter dated June 4, 1979,				
4	consisting of two pages is received and marked				
5	P-15 for identification.]				
6	Q Refer for a moment to P-15 for identification.				
7	In what connection did you see that letter?				
8	A Quite obvious, a copy was forwarded to me from the				
9	Town Hall apparently.				
10	Q When it was forwarded to you, were you asked				
11	to do anything in connection with it?				
12	A No.				
13	Q It was just forwarded to you for informational				
14	purposes?				
15	A Apparently so, yes.				
16	Q Subsequent to that letter to your knowledge				
17	has there been any contact between the town or DEP or				
18	developers concerning the subject matter of P-13, P-14				
19	and P-15?				
20	A I don't really understand your question.				
21	Q Has there been any contact between any				
22	meetings at which you attended or participated involving				
23	township officials and/or land owners in Chatham Township,				
24	so-called developer land owners, relative to the subject				
25	matter of that letter? Namely, the possible interim

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² expansion of the sewer plant?

A Are you speaking of P-15?

4 Q All three of them together.
5 A Again I attend very many meetings. I know I did
6 attend one meeting. There might have been more. Really
7 to be honest with you.

8 Q Do you have any idea when that meeting was?
9 A No. I really don't.

10 Q Aside from the meeting which was held on 11 March 23, which I know you attended because I attended, 12 to your knowledge were there any subsequent meetings? 13 A I don't know. I honestly don't know. There may 14 very well have been, but I'm not really--

15 Q Assuming there's an application for a
16 residential development of one sort or another within the
17 township, would, as part of your requirements of approval,
18 would a tie-in to the sewer system be a necessary con19 dition of approval?

MR. BERNSTEIN: Are you talking about here, Mr. Klein, subdivision approval or site plan approval, or some other type of approval, first?

Secondly, if you could ask the witness if he knows the regular procedure. I'm not

3	to have some clarification.				
4	MR. KLEIN: All right. I'll do that.				
5	Q Do you receive any communications from the				
6	planning board relative to applications for subdivision				
7	or site plan approval?				
8	A No, not to my knowledge. I'm a member of the				
9	planning board, but Iat any time there's any discussion				
10	of a subdivision or something, that may just go on at				
11	the regular meetings, but officially I can't recall ever				
12	being sent something directly from the planning board.				
13	Q Well, for example, if the plan would show a				
14	proposed connection or tie-in to an interceptor line,				
15	which is not now existing, as a member of the planning				
16	board and as director of public works from your own				
17	knowledge and background, how would that be handled?				
18	Is there any approval required by any				
19	department of the town relative to that?				
20	A Well, there'sI don't know if there's an ordinance				
21	that you cannot extend the sanitary sower lines. I'm				
22	very much aware of that because our plant is at capacity.				
23	There is an ordinance that covers that.				
24	Now, if there was something done beyond that, I				
25	would not get that. It would eitner be Killam's office				

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1 Direct 14 2 or Robert Kirkpatrick or John Miller. There's been times 3 that Catlin's handled something and times Kirkpatrick did. 4 is there actually an ordinance to your Q 5 knowledge? 6 About extension of the sanitary sewer lines? А 7 Yes. Q 8 А Yes, there is. 9 MR. BERNSTEIN: You'd be looking 10 for a copy of it I assume from your facial 11 expression? 12 MR. KLEIN: Yes. 13 The only time I would get involved with a sanitary Α 14 sewer connection is an existing one, a street opening permit. Just be mainly for street opening. The physical 15 connection and fees would be paid to the town hall, and 16 Mr. Kirkpatrick's office would inspect the connection. 17 18 My approval would only be the street and repairing 19 of the street. 2 20 MR. BERNSTEIN: Off the record. [There is a discussion off the record.] 21 Mr. Kirkpatrick is in association with you? Q 22 He's our municipal engineer. Α 23 MR. BERNSTEIN: It's Keller, 24 Kirkpatrick in I believe Florham Park. 25

9	A I don't know the exact title. Something, municipal			
10	engineer on a consulting basis I believe.			
11	Q To your knowledge has the planning board			
12	everwell, not ever, but has the planning board let's say			
13	in 1978 or '79 approved a residential subdivision which			
14	involved a request for a waiver of the ordinance relative			
15	to tie-in sewer line?			
16	MR. BERNSTEIN: Wait, Mr. Klein. I'm			
17	not sure I understand the question. Are			
18	you saying have there been any applications			
19	for residential subdivisions where there's			
20	been an applicationstrike that. Where the			
21	application is considering septic tanks			
22	other than sanitary sewers, or is the			
23	question has there been a request that the			
24	ordinance be waived and the developer be			
25	permitted to extend the sanitary sewers?

23	treatment plant?

4	Q Does Madison or Chatham treat any township							
5	of Madison sewerage?

8	A I believe a very small area. Only a few homes I							
9	believe.							
10	Q From what area of town would that be?							
11	A I think it's off Shunpike Road, which is the							
12	northerly section of town. A few homes in there.							
13	MR. KLEIN: Off the record.							
14	[There is a discussion off the record.]							
15	MR. BERNSTEIN: I've concluded with							
16	Mr. Klein's depositions, and it appears that							
17	Mr. Volpelius is finished; therefore, Mr.							
18	Klein has deposed three of the municipal							
19	officials, and I haven't deposed any of the							
20	plaintiffs, and I indicated I would like to							
21	hold both the papers which he's requested,							
22	and I have most of them in my office, as							
23	well as the municipal clerk, Mrs. Lundt,							
24	in abeyance until I can interrogate some							
25	of the plaintiffs' witnesses.							

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However, in order to move this along, I believe Mr. Klein has a request for additional paperwork and documentation, and I can have the municipal officials--I assume it would be the municipal clerk making copies so that once I've had a chance to depose some of the plaintiffs' witnesses, we could give these to ir. Klein with a minimal amount of fuss or time.

Do you want to tell us the documents you want so that we can make a list, and I have most of--I assume all of what you requested at the last series of depositions.

MR. KLEIN: That would be all the planning board material and some of Mr. O'Grady's material.

MR. BERNSTEIN: Most of it.

MR. KLEIN: Right. What I would be interested in are the--

MR. BERNSTEIN: Formal applications? MR. KLEIN: The copies of formal applications and any correspondence relative thereto. That is since August of 1967 when the existing plant opened.

14		If you want to examine those files personally,						
15		we have no problem. As to the sewer						
16		expansion, I assume that's limited documenta-						
17		tion.						
18		MR. KLEIN: When you say extensions,						
19		you're talking about simple extensions of						
20		lines?						
21		MRS. LUNDT: I guess so. I think						
22		extensions of lines. Interceptors.						
23		AR. KLEIN: All right. Well, I'll						
24		make an appointment subject to your						
25		approval to examine that.

2		MR. BERNSTEIN: You could examine
3		that after these depositions. You may have
4		a little time.
5		MR. KLEIN: I do.
6		MR. BERNSTEIN: We can do that.
7		I'm interested in your efficient use
8		of time. After this colloquy which is on
9		the record, I'll go upstairs with you, and
10		Mrs. Lundt will show you the file, and if
11		there are copies you want, at a reasonable
12		rate we'll have copies made for you. That's
13		no problem at all.
14		MR. KLEIN: That will be fine.
15		MR. BERNSTEIN: Now, first we have
16		the formal applications to the DEP and
17		correspondence to the DEP. Is there other
18		items you want Mrs. Lundt to be researching?
19		MR. KLEIN: Well, I'm not sure. You
20		said to the DEP. I'm not sure it's limited
21		to the DEP because there may have been some
22		Federal applications involving EPA, requests
23		to the EPA as well.
24		The other area of documentation which
25		is in Miss Lundt's jurisdiction would be very

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similar to what I requested from Mr. Alpaugh, which is the minutes of meetings relating to introduction and adoption of zoning ordinances.

MR. BERNSTEIN: Now, you're interested in the meetings where the zoning ordinance, the present zoning ordinance, was adopted?

MR. KLEIN: Well, was--the meeting at which the zoning ordinance was adopted took 2.7 seconds.

MR. BERNSTEIN: You were late. I understand by hearsay, Mr. Klein, you were late to the meeting, therefore you didn't get your two cents in.

MR. KLEIN: Well, I got my two cents in.

MR. BERNSTEIN: After it was adopted. MR. KLEIN: Because I have a way of being outspoken sometimes, but I think I got there at about ten after 8, and it had already been adopted, and that portion of the meeting was over, but what I'm also interested in are the minutes of the meetings

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of the township committee involving discussion of the zoning ordinance.

MR. BERNSTEIN: Well, this is the same problem, even though this young lady wasn't the court reporter, it's the same problem we had the last time. I have no problem if there was one meeting. Let me ask Mrs. Lundt.

Was there a single meeting where the ordinance was discussed, or would it be over a period of time because the problem is if it was discussed over a period of two years, then we'd have Mrs. Lundt who's got a lot of other things to do besidesthis litigation. In fact she's more than the town clerk. She has a number of functions.

I don't feel it's fair for her to review minutes for two years. I'd like to know, though, is there any one meeting where this was discussed or two meetings?

MRS. LUNDT: It would be very difficult to say because we have what we call two regular meetings a month, the first one being what was normally a conference, so it's kind of an informal--

MR. BERNSTEIN: Do you have a minute book?

MRS. LUNDT: It's not indexed by subject.

MR. BERNSTEIN: What I'm thinking--MRS. LUNDT: We have a minute book.

MR. BERNSTEIN: Can you get the minutes of the meeting where the ordinance was adopted? We could show Mr. Klein the minute book when we go upstairs, and he can look through it for the past year or two. He can pick out those pages that he feels are pertinent to his case.

MR. KLEIN: Let me ask it another way. Were there any special meetings of the township committee devoted exclusively to, or substantially exclusively to discussions of the master plan and/or the zoning ordinance?

MRS. LUNDT: I do not recall that there were.

MR. BERNSTEIN: They would be in the minutes though, I assume, if there were meetings? One could read through?

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MRS. LUNDT: I do not recall any special meetings in '78 on that subject. I do not recall.

MR. KLEIN: Do you maintain copies of your sunshine notices?

MRS. LUNDT: We have a notice at the beginning of the year that outlines all of the meetings that are set forth, and if there's any deviation, of course there's a notice. Yes, we do keep copies.

MR. KLEIN: Do you also maintain a copy of your agenda for each meeting?

MRS. LUNDT: Uh-huh.

MR. KLEIN: Because that might be a quicker way to go through it.

MRS. LUNDT: Regular meeting. Not the conference meeting.

MR. BERNSTEIN: The only problem I can tell you is we've had moderate amount of municipal work that sometimes discussions drift a wee bit from the agenda, and I have no problem with you trying to shortcut. I mean none of us have an infinite amount of time, but sometimes things are under titles
