

NOTES ON DATA AND METHODS:

POPULATION ESTIMATES FOR STATES, COUNTIES, AND MUNICIPALITIES

This report contains revised July 1, 1981 and provisional 1982 estimates of total population for the State of New Jersey, its 21 counties and 567 municipalities. The 1981 estimates in this report supersede the estimates published in October 1982 by the Department of Labor. While the techniques used to generate the estimates in this report are consistent with those used in the October 1982 publication, revisions tend to reflect more complete and refined input data.

Because of the pressing need for the most current set of population estimates by municipality and the unavailability of all data necessary for one of the two techniques (Administrative Records) used at the municipal level, estimates by municipality were based solely on the Housing Unit Method. It is expected that Administrative Records statistics will be available by the end of 1983, after which the 1982 estimates will be revised.

The New Jersey Department of Labor is the State's participating agency in the Federal-State Cooperative Program for Local Population Estimates (FSCPE). Under the provisions of this program, each state selects an agency to work along with the U. S. Bureau of the Census, to assist each other in preparing current population estimates for the nation as a whole, and for each state and the District of Columbia. The Census Bureau and the participating state agencies cooperate further to prepare county population estimates for the respective states. In a few states--including New Jersey--the participating agency also is responsible for preparing municipal population estimates.

Throughout the process, from national, to state, to county and municipal estimates, sub-area estimates of population are adjusted to be in agreement with the estimate for the larger area. Generally, it has been found that the larger the area involved, the more reliable the estimate is likely to be. *

State Population Estimates.

The methods used to prepare annual state population estimates as of July 1 are: the Ratio-Correlation Method, Component Method II, and the Administrative Records Method. All three methods use the 1980 Census as a base, and are independent techniques for estimating the non-group-quarters population under 65 years of age. The results of the three methods are averaged. Added to that figure are separate estimates of the population in group quarters and of those aged 65 and older. The elderly population is estimated from records on Medi-

care enrollment; and the group quarters population is estimated from annual surveys of the number of persons in selected institutions, military barracks, and college dormitories.

The methods differ only in how they estimate the household population under 65 years old. The Ratio-Correlation Method estimates the distribution of this population by state, using a three-variable equation that measures the net impact of changes since 1980 in (1) elementary school enrollment, (2) the number of federal income tax returns, and (3) the number of persons in the labor force. In Component Method II, natural population change among persons under 65 years old is measured using reported births and deaths, and net migration is estimated from trends in elementary school enrollment. Administrative Records also uses birth and death data, but bases the net-migration estimate on federal income tax returns, comparing the state of residence reported by the taxpayer in the latest year to the one reported in the 1980 base year.

The revised State population estimates for 1981 use all three techniques; but for 1982, the provisional estimates are obtained by determining the average change from 1981 to 1982 of the Ratio-Correlation and the Component II methods only, adding that change to the revised 1981 estimate.

Special adjustments were made by the Census Bureau to account for about 160,000 refugees from Cuba, Haiti, and Southeast Asia who arrived in the U. S. between April 1, 1980 (Census day) and July 1, 1982. In the case of New Jersey, the special adjustment covered approximately 9,380 Cubans and Haitians estimated by the Census Bureau to have arrived in the State between April 1 and September 30, 1980.

Testing of the state estimation procedures by the Census Bureau is near completion. These tests could result in further revision of the 1981 and 1982 state estimates for New Jersey by the end of this year.

County Population Estimates

The methods employed to prepare county population estimates for New Jersey were developed by the State's Department of Labor and the U. S. Bureau of the Census, working together in the FSCPE. For New Jersey, three techniques are used in the county estimates program: the Ratio-Correlation Method, Component Method II, and Administrative Records. All three methods use the 1980 Census as a base. Although these are the same methods used to produce the State population estimate, some of the data sources and computational procedures differ in the county-estimates versions.

The Ratio-Correlation Method uses a multiple regression equation to relate changes in four data series to changes in the distribution of the State's household population among the 21 counties. As a result of continuing tests and evaluations of estimates methods, the Census Bureau and this Department have recently identified a new four-variable equation in which the county data series for New Jersey are: federal income tax returns (x1), the two-year-sum of births (x2), elementary school enrollment (x3), and the two-year-sum of deaths (x4). The equation is:

$$y = 0.005 + 0.286(x1) + 0.231(x2) + 0.289(x3) + 0.188(x4)$$

An estimate of the non-household population is added, based on surveys of the State's largest group quarters facilities. Note that the county-estimates version of the Ratio-Correlation technique does not compute the under-65 and the 65-or-older populations separately.

Component Method II uses reported births and deaths to measure natural change, and elementary school enrollment to indicate net migration, for the counties' household populations under 65 years old. Persons 65 and older are estimated from changes in Medicare enrollment since the 1980 Census. The non-household component is estimated from post-censal changes in the number of persons reported in New Jersey's annual surveys as living in group quarters--such as institutions, military barracks, and college dormitories.

The Administrative Records Method closely resembles Component II, but develops its net-migration estimates from federal income tax returns rather than from elementary school enrollment data. Net migration rates for the under-65-year-old household population of counties are derived after matching individual returns filed for the base (census) year and the current (estimate) year, to measure in-migrants, out-migrants, and non-migrants. Those rates are applied to the base-year non-elderly population, yielding an estimated net migration for the under-65 population component. As in the Component Method II, the 65-and-older population and the group-quarters population are estimated separately and are added onto the under-65 estimate.

The 1981 revised population estimates for New Jersey counties are based on two of the above methods, because the Administrative Records technique has not yet been completed. Thus, only the Ratio-Correlation and Component II results are available. Their individual estimates are averaged and the county figures then are proportionally adjusted to add up to the 1981 revised estimate of the total State population. Had Administrative Records estimates been available, they too would have been included in the averaging procedure.

The 1982 provisional county population estimates also are based on just the Component II and Ratio-Correlation methods. As with provisional estimates of the State population, provisional county estimates are calculated as the average 1981-1982 change measured by the two available methods, applied to the 1981 revised county estimate. Proportional adjustment of those county figures to the 1982 provisional State estimate completes the process.

When the Administrative Records Method is completed, both the revised-1981 and the provisional-1982 county population estimates will be subject to further revision. It is expected that Administrative Records statistics will be available by the end of 1983 or early in 1984.

Municipal Population Estimates

Estimates of the population of New Jersey's cities, boroughs, townships, and other municipalities are calculated using two independent techniques: the Housing Unit Method and the Administrative Records Method. The latter is scheduled to be used to prepare 1982 population estimates for municipalities, but the results are not expected until next year. At that time, those estimates will be averaged with the 1982 estimates produced through the Housing Unit Method, to prepare revised 1982 municipal population estimates.

Until then, however, only the Housing Unit Method is available to make estimates for municipalities. The technique used in New Jersey was designed and developed by the State's Department of Labor. It begins with the supply of permanent year-round housing units counted in the 1980 Census. Changes in that supply are estimated mainly by tabulating local data on residential building, demolition, and conversion permits (adjusted for units authorized but never constructed). In addition, changes in year-round mobile homes are determined through annual surveys conducted by the Department. For a number of seashore communities, the reported building permit activity is adjusted to account for the likelihood that some of the newly-permitted units are intended for seasonal (rather than year-round) occupancy.

Once the current housing stock has been estimated, the occupancy rate of those units is estimated, as is the average household size of occupied units. These factors are based upon each municipality's occupancy-rate and persons-per-household characteristics as of 1980, but modified according to post-1980 trends in the Northeast U.S. as reported in current Census Bureau housing and population surveys. The housing surveys have registered no significant change in occupancy rates for 1981 and 1982, so each locality's 1980 Census-observed occupancy rate has been held constant.

However, the population surveys continue to indicate further declines in average household size, with the Northeast U.S. dropping from 2.78 persons per household in 1980, to 2.73 in 1981 and 2.72 in 1982. Consequently, each municipality's 1980 persons-per-household figure was reduced by 1.8 percent for 1981 and by 2.2 percent for 1982--that is, downward by the same proportion as the trend for the northeastern states as a whole.

The foregoing procedures yield an estimate of the household population of each municipality. The non-household component is estimated from the post-1980 changes disclosed in the annual survey of more than 130 institutions, colleges, and military installations--facilities in which more than half the State's non-household population was lodged as of 1980. The changes are applied to the group quarters populations reported in the 1980 Census.

In addition, special adjustments were made for 16 municipalities that were reported by the Census Bureau as having been impacted by the settlement of Cuban and Haitian refugees immediately after the 1980 Census was conducted. These were places for which the Bureau estimated at least 50 such immigrants in the period April 1 through September 30, 1980.

The version of the Administrative Records Method which is used to make municipal population estimates is almost the same as the one used for the counties. For municipalities, however, there are no Medicare data for estimating the 65-and-older component, so the birth, death, and net-migration factors apply to the entire household population.

In the absence of 1981 municipal estimates produced by the Administrative Records Method, the revised 1981 population estimates shown in this publication were prepared by adjusting the Housing Unit Method's municipal estimates in each county to the revised 1981 county population estimates produced independently (as described in the preceding section). Similarly, the Housing Unit Method's 1982 municipal estimates were adjusted to add up to the provisional county population estimates for 1982.

Estimates of the Elderly

Estimates for July 1, 1981 and July 1, 1982, for persons 65 years of age and over, for the State of New Jersey and its 21 counties, are published for the first time in this report. Tests against the 1980 Census have demonstrated that it is possible to draw on Medicare enrollment statistics to prepare reliable estimates of this growing component of the population.

During the 1970s, county-level estimates of elderly populations were generated in systematic ways for Component Method II and Administrative Records. This procedure is replicated to produce these estimates for July 1 of both 1981 and 1982. First, persons 65 and over enrolled under Medicare for April 1, 1980, were estimated as a linear interpolation between July 1, 1979 and July 1, 1980 enrollees. Next, the changes in enrollments from April 1, 1980 and the dates of the estimates were added to the 1980 Census counts for the population 65 and above. County estimates for the elderly were further adjusted by the ratio of the independent State estimate of the population 65 and over provided by the Census Bureau, to the sum of the county estimates. In this way, the sum of all of the estimates was equal to the State control.

These estimates can be subtracted from the estimates for the total county populations to yield estimates for the population under 65. Although finer age breakdowns are not available by county, additional breakdowns for the State as a whole can be obtained in the Current Population Reports, Population Estimates and Projections, "Estimates of the Population of States by Age: July 1, 1981 and 1982," Series P-25, No. 930, issued April 1983 by the U. S. Bureau of the Census.
